SB 1 - PASSED & SIGNED TO LAW

Prohibit minors from undergoing irreversible and harmful medical procedures to change their gender identity.

SB 3 - PASSED & SIGNED TO LAW

Creates an offense for a person who engages in an adult cabaret performance on public property or in a location where it can be viewed by a child.

SB 5

"The Youth Health Protection Act" makes it unlawful to perform medical procedures or healthcare services upon a minor to facilitate the minor's desire to present or appear in a manner that is inconsistent with the minor's sex.

SB 11 - PASSED

Ensure that state and local governments cannot require COVID-19 vaccine mandates.

HB 238

Defining the term "sex" as a person's immutable biological sex as determined by anatomy and genetics existing at the time of birth and evidence of a person's biological sex.

DID YOU KNOW?

According to the NIH, adolescence is an important time for brain development.

The brain finishes developing and maturing in the mid-to-late 20s. The part of the brain behind the forehead, called the prefrontal cortex, is one of the last parts to mature. This area is responsible for skills like planning, prioritizing, and making good decisions.

According to the NIH, Mental illnesses may begin to appear during adolescence.

Ongoing changes in the brain, along with physical, emotional, and social changes, can make teens more likely to experience mental health problems. The fact that all these changes happen at one time may explain why many mental illnesses—such as schizophrenia, anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder, and eating disorders—emerge during adolescence.
